With licensed bars serving wines, beer and sangria, the invitation is open to all to celebrate Petersham's history and residents.



Standing up to the State Government

For 12 years under the previous NSW Government, the Inner West community was short-changed and neglected.

We are insisting upon real negotiation with the Government over their rezoning proposals and will continue to push back if they don't start listening to our legitimate concerns.







Greenway Update

► Constitution Street Tunnel

The Greenway continues to take shape by creating footpaths, cycleways and parks to connect the Cooks River and Iron Cove at Sydney Harbour. This green corridor will be for the whole community to enjoy.

The latest construction update is the near completion of the tunnel under Constitution Rd, Dulwich Hill and an elevated pathway through the light rail corridor from Constitution Rd to New Canterbury Rd. It's exciting to see it come together for the community to enjoy.





Helping more kids play sport

Council is working with local sporting clubs to deliver a new all -weather sporting surface. The former NSW Government deleted the planned all-weather surface from the final plans for Rozelle Parklands and Council has fought successfully to receive additional funding from the new State Government to be able to deliver the facility at a park nearby.

With women and girls participation in local sport going through the roof local clubs are advocating for new facilities so that local kids aren't turned away from the health and social benefits of sport. An all-weather surface can be used more intensively to allow more children to train and play, as well as reducing cancellations due to rain. Council is working with all local clubs to find the right location for this new facility.



Stopping the spread of tobacconists and vape stores

Inner West Council has resolved to stop the spread of tobacconist and vape stores in the Inner West.

Mayor Darcy Byrne raised a Mayoral Minute at the February council meeting proposing new regulations to cap store numbers.

Council is asking the State Governnment for new powers to require all tobacconist and vape stores to submit a development application and a social impact assessment.

Balmain Town Hall upgrade now under way

Inner West Council is investing nearly \$4 million to revitalise the Balmain Town Hall and Library.

Re-enlivening the Town Hall will help convert it into a modern public performance venue for local artists and musicians.

Works include restoring the beautiful heritage façade and tower stairs and a new connection to the Balmain Town Hall meeting room for better library use.





Lighting up Henson Park

Council unanimously voted to keep the lights longer on at Henson Park.

Led by Councillor Mat Howard, this means that Council will continue to light the oval until 8pm through the winter months.

This makes it safer for joggers and dogwalkers to enjoy the oval for their health and wellbeing.

Council will also investigate further options to light the pathway surrounding the oval. Inclusive and accessible improvements are also planned.



Inner West leads the way in innovative, affordable housing solutions

By waiving the \$1.2 Million discretionary developer contribution, Inner west Council has helped transform a disused Church into 54 new affordable housing units.

This meant that the site could be developed swiftly. The partnership with FreshHope Housing Incorporated and not-for-profit Nightingale Housing will see

the build-to-rent complex of 54 apartments ready in late March. Nightingale Housing were grateful for the practical support of Inner West Council. Former chief executive Jeremy McLeod said "We hope Nightingale Marrickville, made possible with Inner Wests Council's support, sets a precedent for similar innovative housing projects across the country."



Calling all green thumbs!


Customer service stalls FAQ




Balmain had a coal mine and two power stations

In 1897 the deepest coalmine ever to be sunk in Australia was opened next to Birchgrove Public School and only ceased operation in 1931. The coalmine employed about 300 men, working three shifts a day

It's no wonder then that the Balmain Power Station and the White Bay Power Station were founded close by not long after. White Bay was built to power the new electric tram system, the electrification of the railways and the construction of the underground rail lines in the city. It was fully operational from 1917 until it was decommissioned in 1984.

Today the White Bay site is about to become a powerhouse in Sydney's cultural and artistic life as the host of the spectacular Biennale of Sydney and a permanent rededicated arts precinct thereafter.



Inner West calls for stronger action on housing affordability

Inner West Council has made a submission in response to the NSW Government's housing rezoning proposals.

While Council wants to make a contribution to addressing the housing supply crisis we need more information from the Government including how heritage will be protected and what the targets are for new dwelling numbers.

We are firmly insisting on negotiation over these proposals and planning to be done locally with community involvement.

As part of its submission Council has also officially proposed a range of actions that the NSW Government needs to take to address housing affordability, including:

- Establishing a state-controlled corporation to build homes and increase supply for the private sale and rental markets.
- 2. Committing to partnering with Council on our offer of converting 10 Council-owned carparks and depots to be used for public housing.
- 3. Legislating the promised new protections for renters and resourcing the office of the Rental Commissioner to provide advice and assistance to tenants across NSW.
- 4. Replicating the Victorian Government's \$5.3 billion investment in building 12,000 new public housing dwellings.
- 5. Releasing the results of the NSW Government's long-awaited audit of Government owned lands on which housing can be provided.
