

# Meet your new council

On 8 October, the new Inner West councillors were sworn in to serve our community for the next four years

The newly elected Inner West councillors were sworn in in October with Councillor Darcy Byrne re-elected as Mayor and Councillor Mat Howard elected as Deputy Mayor for the first time.

Eight Labor councillors form an outright majority of the council, for the second consecutive term, with five Greens councillors, one independent and one Liberal councillor making up the 15 councillors.

Deputy Mayor, Mat Howard said, "I am honoured to be

elected Deputy Mayor of the Inner West.

"I am so pleased to give back to the community I love through this important new role, whether it is better managing our waste, strengthening our local services or supporting our local LGBTQIA+ communities."

Mayor Byrne said that building on the success of last term, the new council has an expanded progressive policy agenda to deliver on and there isn't a moment to waste. "Through strong financial management we have been delivering a huge amount over the last three years but this new Council will go even further," Byrne said.

"We have a vision of the Inner West as the engine room of progressive politics in Australia and we have a new program of ground-breaking reforms and world-class facilities to deliver now," Byrne said.

# Secret garden

For local Marrickville resident Lyn Vincent, back in 2020, COVID presented an opportunity to give something back to the community.

"I decided to create a garden in the derelict laneway near my home," she says.

Today, the laneway that runs alongside the railway tracks between School Parade and Kays Avenue East, is alive with colour from purple salvia to bright red geraniums and soft grasses.

"I'd choose whatever was in the \$5 section at the local nursery," she explains. "I started with Lomandra grasses up near the mural and I hand-watered them to make sure they survived," she says.

And from little things, big things have grown. Council now helps with maintenance so that this small slice of biodiversity can thrive. "I thought it would be nice for people," Lyn said.

# One year of food recycling

A year of environmental progress

We're celebrating one year of the Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) service, and the results are incredible! Thanks to your efforts, the Inner West community has made a big impact:

- 16,059 tonnes of organic waste recovered
- 8,800 tonnes of garbage diverted from landfill

These carbon savings are equivalent to:

- Powering 9,750 homes for a year
- Taking 19,025 cars off the road
- Preventing 56,421 wheelie bins' contents (240L) from entering landfill
- Preventing waste equal to 5.4 Olympic swimming pools from entering landfill

How to request a pothole to be fixed

#### Did you know you can report a pothole or damaged footpath to Council?

With a wet summer forecast, potholes can quickly open up after periods of rainy weather.

Council is responsible for local roads. You can report potholes and other road or footpath damage though Council's online customer request management system.

We have a form on Council's

website that is easy to fill out and can be done anonymously so you can let us know about a pothole or a footpath that needs fixing.

Council will then repair the pothole within 2 days or within 24 hours if it's an emergency, weather permitting.

The famous Inner West race brings families, school kids and elite competitors together to run the 7km course. The BayRun is a flat course around the iconic Iron Cove Bay Run, then passes through Leichhardt, Rozelle, over the Iron Cove Bridge and back through Drummoyne, Five Dock and Haberfield. #### Teamwork saves the day

When a grease trap overflow in Haberfield sent wastewater trickling into the laneway and stormwater pit, our Environmental Health team jumped into action to turn a sticky situation around.

Upon arriving, they found wastewater flowing towards the gutter due to a blockage in the grease trap. The plumber on site faced a tricky job – unable to clear the line with his equipment. The Council team quickly arranged for a street sweeper, sucker truck, and a crew with kitty litter to tackle the cleanup.

The kitty litter was spread and swept over the wastewater, soaking up the spill like magic! The sweeper truck then made several passes to gather it up, while the sucker truck worked hard to empty the stormwater pits and clean the gutters down the lane.

The local business owner was grateful for the team's support and it's a great example of how our Environmental Health team is always ready to lend a hand and go the extra mile to support our local businesses and our health and safety.

## Preserving Dawnies' precious history


An exciting project is underway for students and history buffs of the Inner West.

# The woman who broke world records and the glass ceiling

Sarah 'Fanny' Durack was not just Australia's first female gold medallist - she was also a woman who didn't meekly succumb to petty officialdom.

Fanny came to prominence when the sport of swimming was segregated by gender and women were only allowed to compete in breaststroke. Male and female swimmers were prevented from swimming on the same program and men were not allowed to watch women compete.

But Fanny was an independent soul, a tomboy and a rebel. She won her first state title in 1906 while still a schoolgirl and bucked the rules by then changing to freestyle. In 1912, the year of the Stockholm Olympics, she set world records in the 100 and 220 yards freestyle.

The public were now demanding she be included in the Olympic team and after much protest and debate, officials relented but refused to pay for her travel.

So, Fanny held fundraisers, paid her own way and set a new world record to win gold in the 100m freestyle final. Australia's only gold of the games.

Fanny died at her home in Stanmore in 1956 and The Fanny Durack Aquatic Centre in Petersham is named in her honour.



## Leichhardt Oval Number 2 gets new amenities block

We have just delivered a new amenities block and clubhouse at Leichhardt Oval Number 2.

The \$1.15 million works include new modular changerooms, a kiosk and repurposed spaces for more storage. This is great news for the many sporting clubs who regularly use this oval including the Balmain Rugby Club, the Balmain Junior Rugby Club and Balmain District Junior Rugby League.




# Wardell Road, Dulwich Hill safety upgrade

We've just completed a \$100,000 upgrade to bring the intersection of Bedford Crescent and Wardell Road in Dulwich Hill up to Australian safety standards. This is part of our Pedestrian Access and Mobility Plan spend of \$2 million.

Works included new landscaped kerbs, repairing the damaged footpath and road and upgrading the pedestrian crossing lighting.
